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An Exciting Year of Taos Institute Activities

A message from Kenneth Gergen, President of the Taos Institute



It is a great pleasure for me to review the activities of the Taos Institute this past year, as the accomplishments inject such energy into our visions for the coming year. Two conferences were shining stars, the first, *Play with Purpose*, held on shipboard in the Gulf of Mexico; and the second a Summer Institute in Copenhagen with the consulting firm Ramboll/Attractor. Workshops on constructionist topics were filled to capacity, as were a dozen others we sponsored with various Associates. The publishing wing brought forth two

new books: Healing Conversations: Enhance Relations with Elders and Dying Loved Ones, Practicing Relational Ethics in Organizations, and a third book coming soon, Developing Relational Leadership. The PhD program with Tilburg University had a banner year, with a full roster of new students, and a record number of 14 graduations. The completed dissertations represented a broad array of topics, many exploring new practices in therapy, organizational development, and education. Also in an educational vein, we joined the Houston-Galveston Institute to launch a Certificate in Collaborative Practices. This program is now offered in seven different countries around the world.

Finally, we are particularly proud of developing a small grant program to fund projects close to our interests, for example, a collaborative initiative in Bangladesh, websites that share resources for therapists and educators, and a book on mediation and medicine. Throughout all of this, we have been guided by the wisdom of a newly developed Associates Council. So, with these warm winds now billowing the sails, we enter the New Year with hope and promise for an array of upcoming activities and innovations. We hope we can share valuable resources with all our friends and associates.

Social Constructionism

A New Year's Reflection from The Taos Institute

2012 begins, and the Taos Institute Board is happy to wish everyone a wonderful new year. When it comes to the New Year, I think I've always been a social constructionist. Despite the fact that the calendar is clearly an invention of a group of learned people who had some desire for order and simultaneity – that is, a socially constructed social



object, it appears to be quite real to those of us who live under its form of 12 months and 365 and ¼ days. Yet it seems to promise more to us than the marking of time, itself. The calendar seems to suggest that January 1 offers us a new beginning, a way to start over with our lives. It allows one to wipe away the tears of sadness and shed the dross of errors that we accumulated in the old year. We even make New Year's Resolutions so that we can formulate just how we are going to change our ways of living – lose weight, stop smoking, exercise more, be a better spouse, spend more time with the children and less with the TV, and so on. Of course, it doesn't take long until our resolutions are broken or at least bent. Our old habits persist, and soon the new year loses its luster, with the return of the usual bumps and grinds.

Still, there are other opportunities every year to have fresh starts – new months, new semesters, new seasons and even new dawns. Play with Purpose: Relational and Performative Practices in Everyday Life

February 2011, Seminar at Sea







What better setting for an exploration of play, performance and relational practices than an ocean cruise! Over 120 participants came together to explore and experience practices for effective improvisation in a wide range of contexts - including psychotherapy, organizational development, education, community building, and personal life. We looked at the ways in which theater, music, humor, movement, art, storytelling and other play/full activities inspire and transform our relationships. Under the canopy of social constructionist theory, we engaged in a multitude of activities designed to enhance both conceptual consciousness and relational skill. "Playshop" sessions gave us a rich opportunity to put performative ideas into practice.

This exciting gathering was co-sponsored by the Houston Galveston Institute and the Taos Institute. We met on a Carnival cruise ship, setting sail from Galveston, Texas and making stops at Progreso and Cozumel, Mexico. Seminar at sea sessions took place on board the ship through keynote presentations and "playshops".

The highlight of the seminar at sea was our time in Progreso, MX. There we met with students and faculty from the local university: Instituto Tecnológico Superior Progreso. All 'seminar at sea' participants were assigned a group and each group was paired up with a group from Progreso. The groups prepared an experience for the other which highlighted how we use play and performance in our everyday lives and relationships to create positive change. Friendships were forged and cultural boundaries crossed. Our time in Progreso with the students was one that will live on in our collective experience and memories.

The venue and theme provided opportunities for reflexive exploration and performance of relational practices in a wide range of contexts. We all benefited from the venture on the high seas of play, improvisation, performance and humor to expand our personal and professional lives.

disciplines, healthcare educators, healthcare consultants, healthcare organizations as well as interested citizens from the general public. I also remain active in the operations of Ryan House, the only freestanding home-like pediatric palliative care facility in Phoenix, Arizona, named for my 10-year-old grandson Ryan, who was diagnosed as an infant with spinal muscular atrophy, a progressive genetic neuro-muscular condition. Ryan House has now been open for 21 months and is providing respite care for over 100 families and has provided end-of-life care for nearly 50 children and their families with a culture that is built on strengths and resilience, emphasizes the celebration of life and makes relationships, collaboration and compassion the cornerstone of its program.



Remembering Barnett Pearce 1943-2011

We are saddened by the loss of Barnett Pearce, scholar, theorist, practitioner, mentor and friend. Barnett, an Associate of the Taos Institute, is best known for the creation of the Coordinated Management of Meaning Theory with his long-time colleague, Vernon Cronen (an Honorary Associate of the Taos Institute). Barnett was always fond of saying that to use CMM (as the theory is known) is to "take the communication perspective" and this consists of "looking at communication rather than through it." Looking



at communication was in evidence in every conversation Barnett had. His attentiveness to what was going on in the moment, his continuous curiosity, and the joy he took in engaging in playful surprise offered his conversational partners a view of what is possible when we "take the communication perspective." Barnett challenged himself and us all to continually ask, "What are we making together; how are we making it; and how can we make better social worlds?" These questions provoke us to pay attention to how entire worlds unfold on all levels from the dyadic to the global. Barnett's intellectual curiosity and passion were insatiable. He was able to ignite inspiration in generations of colleagues and students. Barnett had a wonderful habit of writing provocative pieces and sharing them widely; we will miss these provocations but we will continue to carry his legacy of intellectual curiosity and passion for making better social worlds.

Remembering Ruth Bonner

In memory of Ruth Bonner - 1917-2011

The Taos Institute wishes to honor Ruth Bonner for her lifetime contributions to the International Baccalaureate program and list her among our esteemed Honorary Associates. Ruth had participated in many of the Taos Institute conferences over the past 10 years as she traveled together with her daughter **Yvonne Bonner**, a Taos Institute Associate. We came to know her as a true legend of the international education movement. Ruth Bonner was one of four teachers in Geneva who in 1964 laid the foundation for the International Baccalaurate Programme and for the first time it provided a standardized curriculum across IB schools that has spread all over the the world.



Ruth's physical presence will no longer be with us at our Taos gatherings with her daughter Yvonne, but her spirit will live on in so many people she touched throughout her life. She will be missed by all of us who came to know her and love her.
