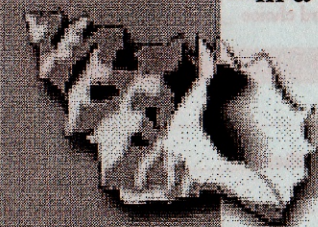

Therapeutic Collaboration

William Madsen, Family Institute of Cambridge
Examines a clinical framework that repositions therapists as appreciative allies eliciting and elaborating threads of competence, connection and hope in families. Addresses broader contextual challenges facing clinicians.

Social Construction and Relational Being

Kenneth and Mary Gergen, Swarthmore College, Penn State University, and The Taos Institute
Presents an introduction to social constructionism and its significance to societal practice. Explores relational conceptions of the person and the social, ethical, and practical implications of relational accounts of meaning.

Renewing Systems from Within for the Public Good

Bliss Browne, Imagine Chicago and The Taos Institute
Examines ways to engage communities in large-scale revitalization based on Appreciative Inquiry. Focuses on practical ways to understand, imagine, and create more vital community futures.

Building Resilience in Families and Couples

Mark Moses, Portsmouth Family Institute
Explores active interventions which stimulate healthy change in couples and families drawing on theoretical underpinnings of Family Systems, Experiential and Narrative Therapies.

Client Change Through Facilitation Processes

Michael Gass, University of New Hampshire and The Browne Center
Focuses on enhancing ability to facilitate change in organizations by accessing areas of strength. Emphasizes organizational change process through several models of facilitation.

Relational Practices in Education and Training

Sheila McNamee, University of New Hampshire and The Taos Institute
Explores social construction and the relational resources that locate education and training within a collaborative learning context. Focuses on creating engaged citizens working to harness hope and possibility in a variety of social contexts.
